FFA BRIDGE Scholarship

To Aid Rural Handicapped

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — America's 8.5 million rural physically disabled are doubly handicapped. Geographically, they may be far from available services. In addition, the extent and level of services in rural and small town areas are limited.

When the disabled are young, they may also be isolated emotionally because of the distances to friends' homes, lack of transportation alternatives and similar factors.

The National FFA Organization has announced a new B.R.I.D.G.E. (Building Rural Initiative for Disabled through Group Effort)

Scholarship program to help address the needs of America's rural disabled. Funded through the National FFA Foundation, the program will award a \$1,000 scholarship to an eligible FFA member who is physically han-

dicapped, a senior in high school and planning to study at a four-year university. It will also encourage FFA chapter action on behalf of the disabled by offering an annual award to the FFA chapter with the most innovative and effective outreach program for the rural disabled.

The B.R.I.D.G.E. Scholarship Committee will select the recipients of the awards. The committee includes: Honorable Peter C. Myers, deputy secretary, U.S. Dept. of Ag., chairman, B.R.I.D.G.E. Committee; Dr. Larry Case, national FFA advisor, president, National FFA Foundation; Honorable John Block, president, National-American Wholesale Grocers' Association; Honorable B. "Kika" de la Garza, chairman, Committee on Agriculture, U.S. House of Representatives; Mr. Don Hayden, past state FFA vice

president, Washington FFA Association; Dr. Doris Helge, director, National Rural Development Institute; Honorable Jesse A. Helms, chairman, Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry, U.S. Senate; Vince Phillips, assistant to the president, National-American Wholesale Grocers' Association; Bernie Staller, executive director, National FFA Foundation; and Price Grisham, Washington, D.C., Representative, B.R.I.D.G.E. Scholarship Fund.


