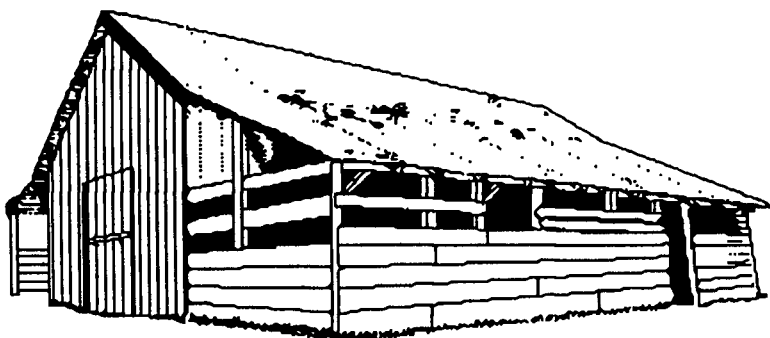
There seemed to be a lack of buyers in the stands at Lancaster Stock Yards, or a lack of buyers willing to pay real money that

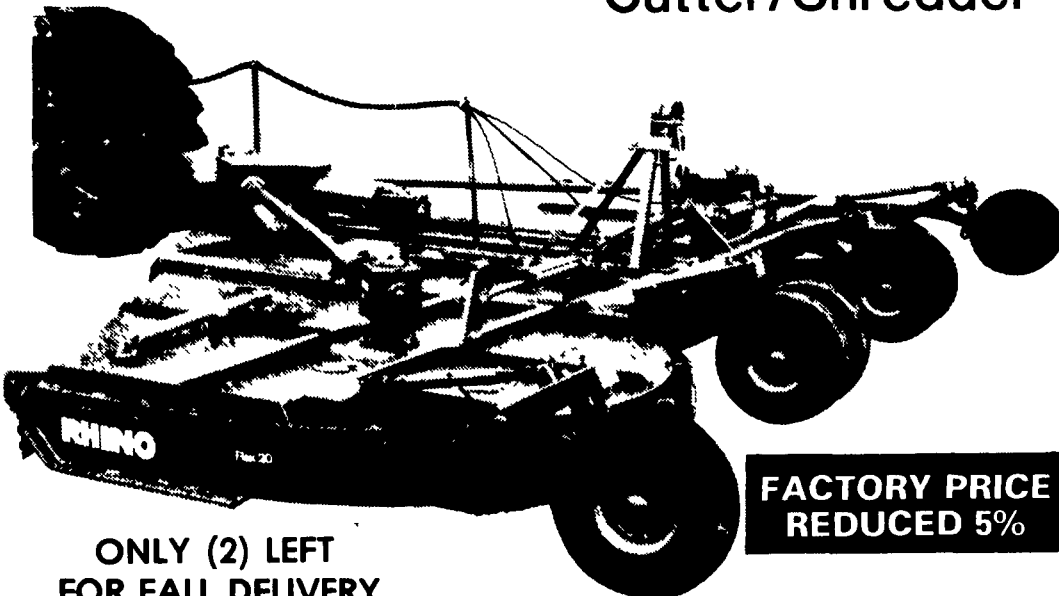
