Tax Booklet Offered

In noting the availability of a booklet on the federal tax reform act, Sen. Chip Brightbill, R-48, said, "Under the new tax law certain financial actions taken this year may prove more beneficial next year and vice versa."

"Because the new tax law was aimed at reform rather than simplification I have decided to make available copies of the 1986 TAX REFORM ACT HIGHLIGHTS."

The booklet explains the sweeping overhaul of the federal tax system including the new rate structure for individuals, the

treatment of capital gains, new rules for IRAs, pension and deferred compensation plans as well as other employee benefit plans. In addition the booklet explains changes in taxation of businesses and corporations.

Brightbill said the 64-page, 4"x6" booklet condensing the 3,000-page tax reform document is available in his district office. The senator explained that anyone wishing to obtain a copy should not delay in contacting his office because each location has a limited number of booklets available.
