Deere Exec Says Money Management Is Key To Farming Success

MOLINE, Ill. - Record crop yields and technological breakthroughs have become commonplace in U.S. agriculture. Have these changes been accompanied by a farm management revolution?

"I don't think there's any doubt about it. American farmers are much more analytical, much better informed about business decision-making than they were in the past," said Dick Yahnke, a man who has dealt with farmers all his life, and is currently director of Deere & Company's North American marketing services for agricultural and consumer products.

"Today's successful farmer views his purchases, his inputs, in terms of receiving a return on

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buying something because he wants it or because his neighbor has one," Yahnke said.

"Farmers cannot control many facets of their business, so it behooves them to obtain optimum levels of return on those factors they can control. Increasingly, this means learning more about controlling cash flow and financing alternatives, more about gaining operating efficiencies; in short, looking for anything that will improve net return on investment.

"Our dealers see a growing awareness of this value and efficiency need. Most farmers who come into the dealerships today are not so concerned about how big a tractor is or whether it has more horsepower than the neighbor's.

investment, rather than just Instead they're interested in the financial aspects of owning or leasing the tractor.

"What is the expected operating cost per hour? What's the most efficient tillage alternative? What's the fuel consumption per hour? What sort of life expectancy? What's the warranty program? What trade-in value five years from now? What sort of replacement parts am I going to be buying?'

Yahnke re-emphasized the point: "There's been a real change in perception among farmers in the last 10 years. Farmers want more facts on financial management. They want more information on how to deal with money; more details on how to make their assets work for profit."

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To help answer this need, Deere & Company recently published Farm and Ranch Business Management. The book was originally released as a text, but is now available through John Deere dealers for anybody who wants to purchase a copy.

Regarding the company's effort to provide better financial management information to farmers, Yahnke said, "It makes good sense. Farmers are our

customers, and if we can supply information that helps them increase profits, it's good for everybody related to agriculture." "I believe that in the long run,

we are going to see a stronger, better balanced, more competitive American agriculture," said Yahnke.

"The profitability will come back to agriculture. There's no question about it."


Electronic fuel injection is added to gasoline engine powered pickups up to 10,000 pounds GVW for improved acceleration, passing and pulling ability.
