and buildings.

According to John Hess of John J. Hess II Inc. in Paradise, the standard weapon to combat these pests is a baiting program. Many rodenticides now available, however, may be ineffective because a growing number of rodents have become anticoagulant-resistant.

"Evidence now suggests that between 5 and 30 percent of all the rodents in the U.S. have become resistant to popular anticoagulent baits. This means a lot of wasted time, money and grain for the farmers," Hess says. "The problem could have serious implications, especially in the Paradise area."

An individual rodent can burrow into walls and ruin insulation, chew electrical wiring, nest in harvesting equipment and eat about \$24 worth of grain each year, Hess points out.

In addition, farm animals that eat grain contaminated by rodent urine, droppings and hair may acquire and transmit a number of diseases within the herd, including leptospirosis, salmonella and trichinosis.

To combat infestations, the dealer recommends a three-pronged approach of "rodentproofing" buildings, sanitizing facilities and baiting infested areas. "With cement or sheet metal, seal all openings around pipes entering buildings, or areas through which rodents have already gnawed," he advises. "Also, housings on aeration and

drying equipment should be covered when not in use to keep rodents out of bins.'


It's also important to clean out debris and garbage and remove spilled grain from around feeders or storage bins. Rubbish and weeds should also be cleared away from outside buildings to expose rat burrow system and rodent entryways, the dealer adds.

"The third and most crucial stage to an effective year-round rodent control is an effective, baiting program," he says.

A well-managed control program along with an effective rodenticide will help farmers protect their harvests and prevent costly damages to their farms, the dealer concludes. "A year-round rodent prevention program will go a long way towards reducing losses and maximizing profits."


