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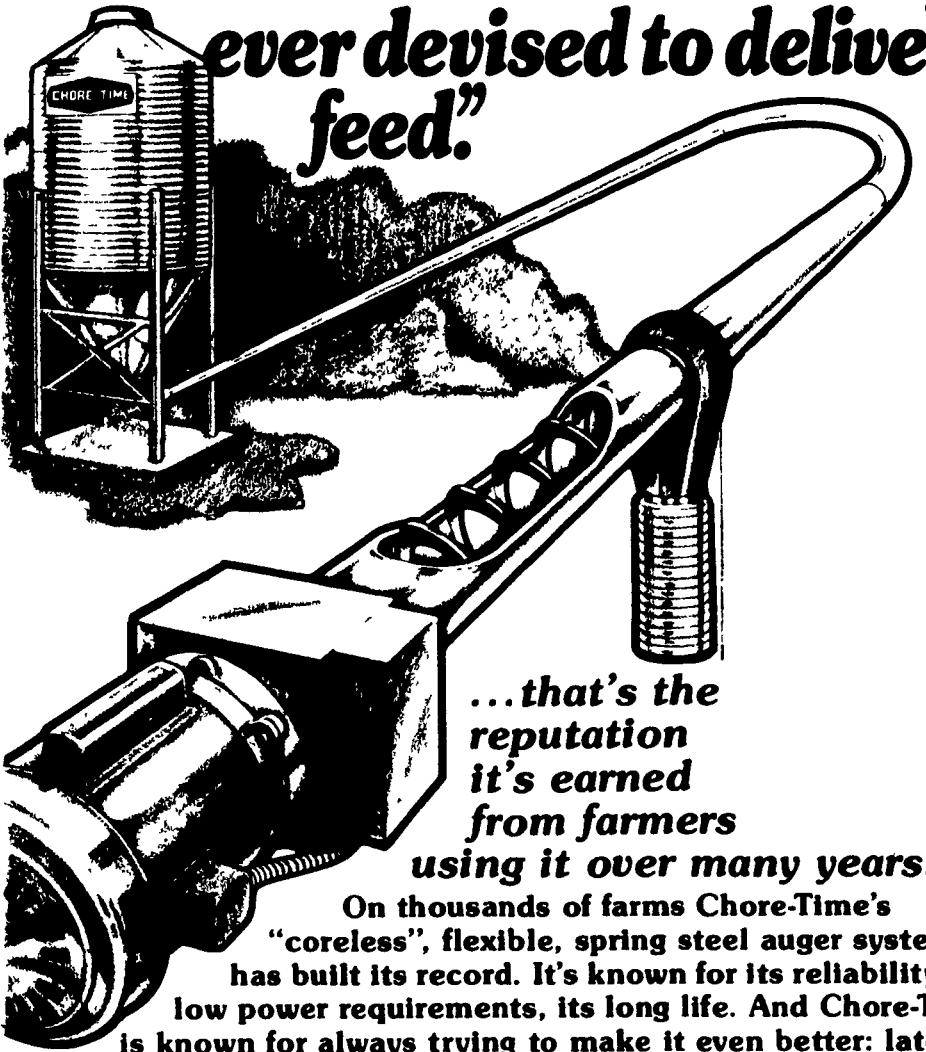
ALEXANDRIA, Va. — Middle Atlantic Order Market Administrator Joseph D. Shine today announced a Class I milk price of \$14.30 per hundredweight for April 1987. This price is down 43 cents from March but is 48 cents above last April's Class I price.

Shine announced a Class II milk price of \$11.31 per hundredweight for February 1987 and a butterfat differential of 15.7 cents for the month. The Class II price was down 44 cents from the previous month, while the butterfat differential decreased one-tenth of a

cent. The April 1987 Class I price and the February 1987 Class II price are based on the February 1987 Minnesota-Wisconsin manufacturing milk price of \$11.27 per hundredweight at a 3.5 percent butterfat content.

The USDA reported that the wholesale price of Grade A butter at Chicago for February was \$1.3675 per pound and the nonfat dry milk price was \$.7940 per pound, f.o.b. plants in the Chicago area.

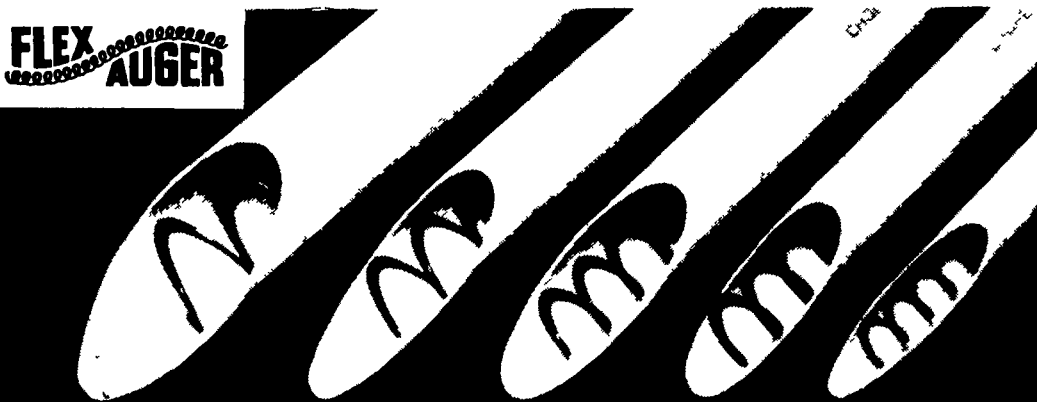
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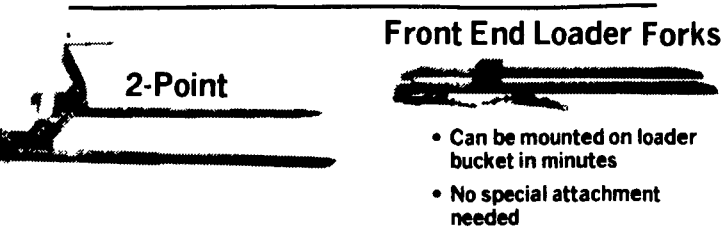
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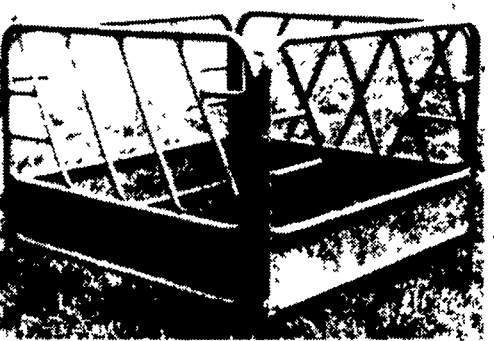


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
