The Society of Farm Women of Cambria County convention convened at 10 a.m. with 69 members and guests attending. Joanne Zane, past president, gave


the welcome. Mary Coolbaugh and Florence Lane led devotions and the salute to the flag. Adams Township conducted a memorial service in memory of two deceased members.

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
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
