Dairy Conference Set In Lancaster

CAMP HILL — A free, day-long conference on the "Strategic Use of Whole Cotton Seed and Distillers Dried Grains with Solubles for Health and Productivity in High Producing Dairy Cows" will take place from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., Aug. 4 at the Lancaster Farm and Home Center.

The Dairy Nutrition and Herd Health Conference is being sponsored by PACMA, a marketing affiliate of the Pennsylvania Farmers' Association (PFA).

Three faculty members from the University of Pennsylvania's School of Veterinary Medicine will give 30-minute presentations followed by a panel discussion during the morning session. Leading off, Dr. David Galligan, Assistant Professor of Epidemiology in Animal Health Economics will discuss "Selecting Feed Ingredients with an Economic Emphasis." Afterwards, Dr. James Ferguson, Lecturer in Clinical Reproduction, will address the "Effects of Different Protein Sources on Health, Production and

Reproduction." Finally Dr. William Chalupa, Professor of Nutrition, will discuss, "Effective Feeding of Whole Cotton Seed in Dairy Cows".

Following a free, buffet lunch, the conference will resume with a presentation on the "Whole Cotton Seed Supply vs. Demand Picture, Availability and Pricing Structures," by J. Michael Breedlove, President, Cottonseed, Inc. of Corninth, Miss...Richard Carlson, Marketing Representative for Archer, Daniels, Midland of Peoria, Ill., will address "Distillers Dried Grains w/Solubles, Supply Vs. Demand, Quality Control". PACMA Marketing Coordinator Dwight Allshouse will wrap up the conference with a discussion of "Forward Pricing for Profit".
