## Fairyland **Texas Farmer Predicts** Economic End

**BY LOUANN GOOD** ANNVILLE --- A well-known organic farmer from Texas warned farmers that he sees difficult days ahead.

Frank Ford lectured at the Pennsylvania Natural Living Conference held at Lebanon Valley College last weekend; later, he met with farmers in small groups throughout the local area.

He said, "We have been taking anesthesia from government administration and America must get ready for difficult times after enjoying an economic fairyland."

Farmers, he contends, will suffer greatly unless they prepare now.

To prepare, he believes, farmers must become debt-free even if it means reducing the scope of their operations. "If you can't get out of debt, sell everything in order to become solvent."

Ford believes the government



caters to corporations, not the farmer. He quoted statistics that show that over 60% of corporate wealth is held by 200 corporations. "This," he contends, "upsets the balance of power and threatens free enterprise, especially for farmers."

This one-time Barry Goldwater campaign-manager reiterates his former boss's famous quote, "Government is no longer government of the people, but of the money and interest.'

Corporations, Ford said, make huge profits without paying taxes. Producers, like farmers, suffer while corporations rake in the money. Reprocessed farms go into holding companies where they are swallowed up by insurance companies and other industries. He said, "We need a society where

people can stay on the land." Ford pictures that society as one where farmers diversify their crops

and avoid over-abundance, where hunger." He believes that America they have reduced their input costs and where they relate to God's creation in good stewardship in gardening techniques and by eating a basic healthy diet-not processed foods where nutrients have been removed.

Ford, who has served on the Advisory Committee to three U.S. Secretaries of Agriculture, said that government employment statistics are puffed up by teenagers working in fast food industries. He points out that our nation's wealth must be based on production, not consumption.

This 27 year veteran of organic farming states America better not take their farmers for granted. "Other countries take care of their farmers because they have known

is destined for hunger since our nation has gone from the position of largest creditor to the largest debtor within four years. He said, "This is not political courage, but bitter fruit for our nation."

Ford has combined sales of over one million copies from his four books titled: "Coming Food Crisis," "The Simpler Life Cookbook," "New Harvest, and Occupy."




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
