This year's project for Lucinda was a sea green brocade gown, simple, but elegant. The project evolved from the fabric, which Lucinda selected at G Street in Rockville, Maryland, before choosing the Butterick pattern.

She decided to make the gown to wear to her junior-senior banquet at Lancaster Mennonite High School; consequently, she completed most of the work during the school year. Now she says, "I'm glad I chose a gown because I can also wear it as Pennsylvania Veal Queen." She won the Veal Queen title after the gown was completed, but doing promotional work will give her ample opportunity to wear the garment.

G Street, adding, "The variety is

great and there is a whole floor of fabric. They really have quality fabric." The brocade appealed to her and then she sought an appropriate pattern. "Sometimes the fabric decides what you make," she commented.

A member of the Penn Willow 4-H Club for 10 years, Lucinda recalls, "I really wanted to join as a little kid. I couldn't sign up the first year I was eight because I wasn't old enough; it was a big disappointment. I cried."

She has more than made up for time lost during that waiting period, and, today, she credits 4-H with much of her success. "My 4-H background definitely helped me get the title of Veal Queen. Being in fashion revue teaches you to be very poised."

Although this is probably her last year in 4-H, Lucinda says she definitely wants to help with fashion revue in the future. "I would like to teach the girls how to talk about their garments with the judges. There are things the judges will never know unless the 4-H'ers tell them. I'd like to go back and see how I was as a junior. It was definitely gotten easier."


