

Thompson Takes Honors At Potter County Dairy Show

Top honors at the annual Potter County Open Dairy Show went to Donald Thompson, who manages Snyder Farms, Westfield. Don took the All Breed Champion, Grand Champion Female and Senior Champion Female with his three-year old Holstein Jim-Slocums Triple Charo. He received a silver tray from Headquarters Production Credit for all breed champion and a desk set from Catelinn Farms, Rexville, N.Y., as Grand Champion Female Holstein.

Snyder Farms won the premier breeder award, a desk set from Dan and Shirley Tice and Sons, and the premier exhibitor award, a desk set given by Snyder Farms, went to Donald Thompson.

The Grand Champion Brown Swiss cow was Conover Hill Dona Gertrudis, a five-year-old cow, owned by Diane Prince, Shinglehouse. She received a desk set from Check-R-Board Feeds.

Grand Champion Jersey was Edko Missy Yolanda Nippersink, shown by Jeremiah Kosa, Ulysses, and was a dry cow, four years and under. Jeremiah won a desk set, given by Allegen Farms. The Junior Champion Holstein was an Intermediate Yearling Dunlea Stony, shown by Scott A. Buchsen, Coudersport. Buchsen won a desk set given by Comstock Farms, Port Allegany, R.D.

Reserve Champion Holstein and Reserve Grand Champion Holstein was Allegen Chairman Colene from Allegen Farms, Genesee. The reserve junior champion Holstein was Del-Hollow TT Copper-Red-ET-OC, owned by Dana Erway, Coudersport, and shown by his son, Jesse.

The grand champion bull calf

was Bailey-View Prophet Hank, owned by Gerald Pirrung, Ulysses.

Taking first place blue ribbons among Holsteins were: junior heifer calf, Snyder Elvan Janise, shown by Don Thompson; intermediate heifer calf, Del-Hollow TT Copper-Red-ET-OC, owned by Dana Erway; senior heifer calf, Triple Miracle Revelation, owned by Bailey View Farm; summer yearling heifer, Randal Chief Starbuck Monique, owned by Bailey View Farm; junior yearling heifer, Highlander Ginger Bell Gina, owned by Comstock Farm; intermediate yearling heifer, Dunlea Stony, owned by Scott A. Buchsen and senior yearling heifer, Snyder Chief C. Shannon Scooter, shown by Donald Thompson.

Taking first place in junior Get-of-Sire, three animals under two years old, all by one sire was Tony, shown by Buchsen, Comstock, and Pirrung.

Taking a blue ribbon for dry cow four years old and under was Harkenrider Sexy March from Ansdale Farm, Ulysses, while first place in dry cow, five years and older, went to Riss-Dale Chief LuLu, owned by T. Kevin Risser.

First place junior two year old went to Karl Torrey. Top senior two-year-old was Lock-Bur Ultimate Hann, shown by Bailey View Farm. In the three year old class first place went to Jim-Slocums Triple Charo, shown by Donald Thompson, while the top four-year-old was shown by Karl Torrey. Leon Tice had the top five year old, F&F Lucky Creek Candy, while Donald Thompson had the top six years old and over, Ivajen Creek-Bluff Ina. Tice and Torrey are from Coudersport.

Taking top honors for best udder

was Karl Torrey. Allegen Farms took the award for best three females. Top produce of dam award went to Allegen Farms, exhibitor Kay Smoker while Karl Torrey took the top dam and daughter award.

In the Brown Swiss division, Diane Prince took senior champion female and first place five year old cow with Conover Hill Dona Gertrudis, while Patrick Prince took reserve grand and senior champion with Conover Hill All Plus Queen. Diane also won the lam and daughter class and a blue ribbon for senior two year old with Prinfam Impro Foxy Lady.

Patrick took a blue ribbon in the three year old class with Prin Fam King Kristie and in the intermediate yearling class with Prin Fam Dot Sweetie.

In the Jersey division, Jeremiah Kosa took senior and grand champion female with Edko Missy Yolanda Nippersink, and the reserve grand champion was Rynell Barker, Ulysses, with Los Hill Benjamin Lola, a junior yearling which also took a blue ribbon in that class and was junior champion female. Jeremiah Kosa took

first place in senior heifer calf and junior reserve champion with Edko Yolanda Bossy Beauty.

In the beef show which preceded the dairy show, Alan Cornell, Ulysses, showed the champion female, Lacie, a Hereford in the three to four year old class, while the reserve champion female was Jem Miss Victro Ban, a polled Hereford shown by Nedra Matthews, Shinglehouse. Taking blue ribbons were Eric Fuller, Shinglehouse, for a junior heifer calf; Mary Ann Payne, Shinglehouse, junior heifer calf, Rusty, a limousin-Black Angus; Chad Carpenter, Shinglehouse, for a summer yearling, Sheena, who is 1/2 Chianina; Stephanie Carpenter, Shinglehouse, VV Ginney, a pure breed Simmental and Judy Erway, Genesee, for Ballantrea Pride N386, an Angus. Janet Matthews, Shinglehouse, took a first place with a Polled Hereford junior yearling heifer, HH Miss Lamplighter H62, while Nedra Matthews, Shinglehouse, took first place in two-year-old heifer with JEM Miss Victor Ban, and Alan Cornell, Ulysses, took first place in three and four year old cow, Lacie.

Taking first place in medium weight was Peggy Tomb, Ulysses with Billy Bob; while Janet Matthews had the Grand Champion and heavy weight steer, Jed, a Simmental/Hereford.

Alan Cornell took first place in Feeder Class Steers, 300-400 pounds with B.J., a Hereford, and Jeremiah Kosa, took first place in feeder class, 401-500 lbs. with Seth, a Holstein/Simmental.

Other contributors to the show were Sarah Gilliland, Kevin and Martha Risser, and Barkstead Farms.

Serving as ringmaster was Dale Hoffman, Millport, while Roland Duperron was announcer. Dairy Princess Betty Jo Douglass handled ribbons. Catalog clerks were Earl Brown, Gay Torrey and Carol Hoffman. Everett Booch was premier breeder scorer while Jerry Pirrung, Gene Thompson and George Barker served on the barns committee. Larry Ackley, Kane, was beef judge and Lynn Miller, Towanda was dairy judge.



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
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
