The Senior Champion and Grand Champion of the Holstein breed competition was the six year-old cow, Smithdale Rosemary Marvex, shown by Michael Smith of Shippensburg FFA, Cumberland County and the Reserve Senior Champion and Reserve Grand Champion was four year-old Ben-Lou Angie shown by Benjamin Dum, Jr. of West Perry FFA, Perry County. The Junior Champion Holstein of Suzanne Hash, Kennard Dale FFA, York County, was junior yearling Woodbine Valiant Ed Faith and the Reserve Junior Champion was Weller Standard Sally, a senior yearling shown by Dennis Weller of West Perry FFA, Perry County.

In the Bred and Owned classes, Benjamin Dum, Jr. of the West Perry FFA received top honors with his Holstein four year old, Ben-Lou Angie and Paul Rauhauser of Dover FFA received first with his intermediate yearling Guernsey, Lilac Springs Future Amanda.

The evening prior to the dairy show, Jeff Reasner, of Shippensburg, provided the show participants with a clipping demonstration on ways to improve their animals appearance in the show ring.

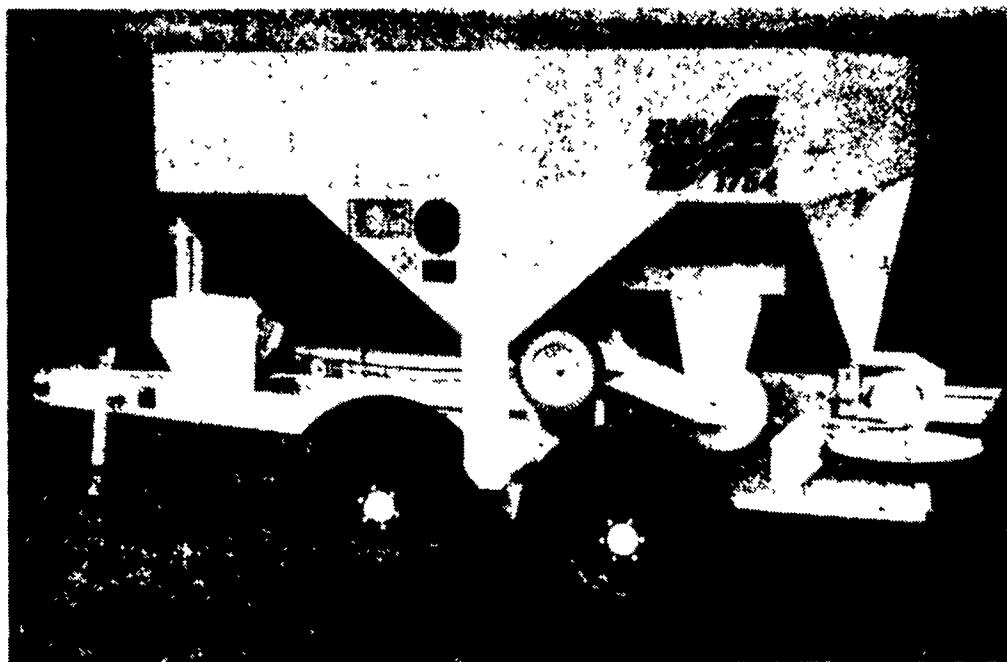
