## Study Predicts Flood Damages To Double


Damages caused by flooding in the upstream areas will double in the next 50 years. In the year 2030, the U.S. Department of Agriculture projects that upstream damage will be nearly \$10 billion (in 1980 Dollars). In 1985, flood damages amounted to \$5 billion.

The estimate of flood damages are contained in the second RCA Appraisal compiled by USDA. The Resources Conservation Act

(RCA) of 1977, as amended, requires that USDA Appraise soil, water and related resources on the non-federal land of the United

Sixty million acres, or 14 percent, of America's cropland is flood prone land. Because of the high agricultural productivity of this land, it is expected to remain devoted to crop production.







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
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
