Governor Casey's prompt action in signing legislation authorizing the Referendum and his strong support of it is a positive step toward preserving agriculture in Pennsylvania, Detier told the PFU Legislative Committee at their meeting in State College. The Committee later voted unanimously to support this Referendum.

'Pennsylvania has lost an average of 90,000 acres of farmland a year to development. This is a very disturbing fact, considering that agriculture provides one out of every five jobs in the state and adds billions of dollars to our state economy. It is critical that all voters in this state support this important issue," Deiter added.
