Red & White Named Manheim Fair Grand Champion Holstein

MANHEIM - For the first time in Manheim fair history a red and white Holstein was chosen as the Holstein grand champion of the dairy show.

Owned by Lowell and Deb Brubaker of Hilltop Heritage Farm in Mount Joy this red and white Holstein six-year-old, H.H. Triple Threat Sugar, has a production record of 23,879 pounds of milk and 849 pounds of fat.

Brubaker was pleased with the win, but somewhat surprised. This was the first show for Sugar this year. Why so late in the showing season did he decide to exhibit the red and white cow?

'She is a real good red cow and we decided to show her because she really looked good in the barn. She has eye appeal," said Brubaker.

Brubaker also exhibited the reserve grand champion, Penn-Har-Va Sexy Tammy, a 6-year-old red and white cow. This prefix comes from Lowell's parents' farm. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Brubaker also live in the Mount Joy vicinity.

Sugar is classified as VG-87 with an excellent mammary system and Tammy also has the same numbers with an excellent mammary system. The last time Lowell exhibited a grand champion at the Manheim Fair was three years ago.

Hill Top Heritage Farm milks 130 Holsteins in its 300-head herd and has a rolling herd average of 17,600 pounds of milk with 587 pounds of fat with a BAA of 103.

Sugar has produced 14 pregnancies sired by Elevation for the Brubakers.

In the Ayshire division Angie Spickler, daughter of James and Linda Spickler of Mount Joy took the grand championship title and also the junior champion title. Michelle Kerdeman captured the reserve grand championship with

her 4-year-old. Heather Becker won the reserve junior honors.

Her brother Daryl, 9, took the reserve junior title with his junior heifer calf. Their parents are Gerald and Cheryl Harnish of Yellowgoose Road, Lancaster.

Show judge was Lloyd E. Ebersole from Sire Power.


