

MARKET COMMENT: PRICES WERE UNCHANGED TO LOWER. TRADE SENTIMENT WAS BARELY STEADY TO WEAKEST ON MEDIUMS. CARTONED EGG DEMAND CON-TINUED TO SHOW SIGNS OF IMPROVEMENT AND RANGED SLOW TO GOOD, MOSTLY MODERATE. SUPPLIES OF MEDIUMS WERE PLEN-TIFUL WHILE LARGE AND EXTRA LARGE WERE AMPLE.

COMMENT: BUYING INTEREST WAS LIMITED AND UNAGGRESSIVE AS PARTS TAKE A BACK SEAT TO HOLIDAY ITEMS. CUTLETS WERE OCCASIONALLY IN BALANCE, BUT OVERALL THE SUPPLY HAS INCREASED, AND ADDITIONAL PRO-DUCT WAS TOUGH TO MOVE. LINE-RUN BREASTS WERE MORE THAN AMPLE FOR IMMEDIATE NEEDS AND SOME SALES WERE EVEN NOTED BELOW TODAY'S PRICE LEVELS. RIB BREASTS WERE IN LIM-BO AND GENERALLY FOLLOWING THE TREND OF LINE-RUN BREASTS. LEGS AND LEG QUARTERS WERE AMPLE TO OCCASIONALLY BURDENSOME WITH DISCOUNTING STILL NOTED FOR PROMPT SHIP-MENT; HOWEVER, SOME ADVANCE INQUIRY WAS NOTED ON LEG QUARTERS. WINGS WERE CLEAR-ING WELL, BUT THE DEMAND WAS NOT AS AGGRESSIVE. LIVERS WERE AMPLE, AND GIZZARDS WERE UNAVAILABLE REGARDLESS OF

Thursday, November 19, 1987 DEMAND FOR READY-TO-COOK WHOLE BIRDS WAS VERY LIGHT. OFFERINGS RANGED IN FAIRLY GOOD BALANCE TO READILY AVAILABLE WITH BUYERS SHOW-ING NO INTEREST AT MOST POINTS. MOVEMENT IN THE PARTS COM-PLEX WAS SLUGGISH EXCEPT ON GIZZARDS AND WINGS WHICH CLEARED WELL. LESS THAN TRUCK-LOT ASKING PRICES WERE GENER-ALLY UNCHANGED BUT MOST SELLERS NOTED DIFFICULTY IN MAKING SALES AT 43 TO 53 CENTS. Tuesday, November 17, 1987 NATIONAL EGG MARKET - AT A GLANCE:

PRICES IN THE MID-ATLANTIC WERE UNCHANGED TO LOWER, UNCHANGED ELSEWHERE. THE MARKET TONE WAS UNSETTLED ON THE WEST COAST AND IN PARTS OF THE MIDWEST, BARELY STEADY TO WEAK IN OTHER AREAS. RETAIL DEMAND FOR CARTONED EGGS WAS DISAPPOINTEDLY IRREGULAR AND COVERED THE FULL RANGE; HOWEVER, MOST REGIONS HAD BEST MOVEMENT WHERE RETAIL FEATURES WERE IN PROGRESS. FLOOR STOCKS AND OFFERINGS WERE PLENTIFUL IN ALL AREAS WITH SURPLUS OBTAINABLE AT INCREASINGLY COMPETITIVE PRICES. MOVEMENT OF MATERIALS INTO BREAKING CHAN-NELS WAS UNAGGRESSIVE EVEN AS COSTS DECLINED.
