In the Dairymen, Inc. protein premium payment plan, a producer receives 12 cents a point for every point of protein over 3.2% if their

somatic cell count is below 500,000. There is a sliding scale payment for SSC of 11 cents for 500,001-600,000; 9 cents for 600,001-700,000; and 7 cents for 700,001-800,000. Protein payments are based on the arithmetic average of at least three SCC each month.

There are also additional charges to the shippers. When the Board of Directors of Dairymen, Inc. approved this plan it was on the premise that those who benefited from this would also have to bear any additional costs in the handling and testing of this milk.

Yates supplied information revealing that during the month of November the shippers on the tanker load going into Jefferson Cheese paid an extra 40 cents per hundred weight in hauling and testing costs. However, based on the fourteen shippers on that load, the average dairyman shipped milk testing 4.02% protein with a SSC average of 328,000 and even after the deductions for hauling and testing still netted almost 58 cents per hundred weight in premium.

Yates stressed that while the hauling the testing appear to be high at this point, as more shippers

come into the program, those costs will go down. Testing fees will be lowered by increased numbers tested. Hauling costs will be lowered when a second truck is added to the route, decreasing the total mileage now divided among all the shippers regardless of their proximity to Jefferson Cheese.

The present tanker load is now full. Yates anticipates the second truck being added to the route by March 1st. He projected, "Our goal is to get the hauling costs down to only an extra 20 cents."

A brief business meeting followed Yates' presentation. It was announced that the PA All-American Dairy Show will implement a Jersey Futurity Class beginning with this year's show. Contributions are being sought to help establish the futurity funds for its first two years. The Cumberland Valley Jersey Breeders Association voted to contribute \$200.00 to this year's purse.
