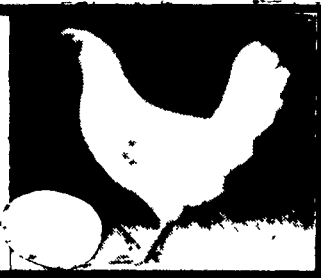

NATIONAL EGG MARKET - AT A GLANCE:

Prices were unchanged. The market tone was generally steady. Movement of cartoned eggs was slow to moderate, better in areas with specials in progress or planned. Supplies of the large sizes were adequate to available and mediums were generally adequate but occasionally in short supply. Breakers were quiet under a steady market tone. Spent hen offerings were fully adequate and plant schedules were often booked into February.

Prices were unchanged. The undertone was cautiously steady. Demand for cartoned eggs was slow to moderate, best where retail features developed for next week. Floor stocks were adequate to fully adequate. Large and extra large offerings from production areas were ample, medium offerings were adequate.

Legs and leg quarters were fully adequate and available at slightly lower prices. Wings remain burdensome and several sellers can not find a home for their product even with giving sharp discounts. 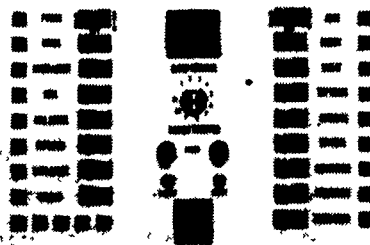
