

MARKET COMMENT: PRICES WERE UNCHANGED TO LOWER. CARTONED EGG MOVEMENT THROUGH RETAIL CHANNELS WAS GOOD TO VERY GOOD, LIGHT INTO INSTITUTIONAL ACCOUNTS. INTER-DEALER TRADE FOR IMMEDIATE SHIPMENT WERE AT STEADY LEVELS WHILE SOME NEGOTIATIONS FOR LATER DELIVERY WERE AT COMPETITIVE PRICES, SUPPLIES OF LARGE SIZES WERE GENERALLY ADEQUATE AND MEDIUMS WERE ADEQUATE TO SOMETIMES AMPLE. THE UNDERTONE WAS CAUTIOUS.

Demand for ready-to-cook whole birds was generally insufficient to clear a fully adequate to ample supply. Breast items and leg quarters were at least adequate with the remaining items fully adequate to ample. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 47 to 53 cents and discounting

### National Egg Market

Wed., March 30, 1988

Medium prices were lower in the Midwest, balance unchanged. The market tone was cautiously steady. Retail cartoned egg movement was primarily good to very good where widespread features prevailed, sometimes slow without specials. Supplies were generally adequate to fully adequate and clearing well except mediums in the Midwest and extra large supplies in the Northeast were occasionally barely adequate. Breakers remained unaggressive and planned reduced schedules. Light type fowl were irregularly available due in part to processor discrimination against flocks with discolored flesh from vaccination.

#### Northeast Chicken Parts

Trading activity was light to fair and generally selective. Cutlets remained fully adequate at current price levels with some ongoing discounting in the 170's to clear inventories. Breasts were spotty in availability, but at least adequate for an irregular buying interest. Legs were fully adequate to ample, while leg quarters generally moved well at 18 to 19 cents. Wings were ample

for a limited inquiry.
