Prices were unchanged. The market tone continued about steady. Cartoned egg movement was mostly moderate in a range of slow to fairly good. Widespread features geared-up in Southern California and Arizona while other regions had limited specials. Supplies were generally adequate to fully adequate and available when needed except extra large and jumbo in the Northeast were sometimes barely adequate. Breakers attempted to purchase shell eggs at lower prices than offered. Fowl plants worked irregular schedules depending on finished product demand which was generally light.

Breast items and wings were generally adequate and clearing well. Legs and leg quarters were fully adequate with leg quarters in the longest position. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 48 to 57 cents. Live supplies were moderate to heavy. Weights were desirable to heavy. Slaughter schedules were moderately heavy. The undertone was barely steady to weak.
