Beef Preview And Jackpot Show Set

Bedford Co. Correspondent BEDFORD - Four-H Club and FFA members from across Pennsylvania and Maryland are being invited to compete in the Beef Preview and Jackpot Show at the fairgrounds here June 25. Top honors will include \$500 for grand champion steer and \$150 for grand champion heifer.

Previously aimed at youths from the six-county central Pennsylvania area, the show "is really trying to enlarge this year," stressed Bedford County Agent Susan Fox. Last year's event drew 75 competitors. C. J. Furlong of Alum Bank RD 1 is chairman, with assistance from county 4-H leaders and FFA advisors.

Steers will be divided into classes according to hip height. Judging will be based on the prospective outcome of the steers at market readiness. The grand champion will receive, in addition to \$500, a trophy; the reserve champion will be awarded \$250 and a trophy. Five placings in each class will receive cash prizes.

The female show will be judged by breed, with age classes designated if sufficient numbers are entered, Fox said. The reserve champion female will be awarded \$125.

Animals may be taken to the fairgrounds between 2 p.m. June 24 and 8 a.m. June 25. A clipping and fitting demonstration will be staged June 24 at 7 p.m. A dance for participants will follow in the 4-H Building on the grounds.

Cattle will be processed after 8 a.m. on June 25, with judging of females to begin at 12:30 p.m., followed by steer judging, then a fitting and showmanship contest.


