

# HAY MARKETS



## National Grain Market

St. Joseph, Mo.  
Wed., June 1, 1988

CASH GRAIN AND SOYBEANS CLOSED MIXED. BENEFICIAL RAIN IN HARD RED WINTER WHEAT BELT AREAS ALLEVIATED DRY CONDITIONS, PRESSURING PRICES LOWER. HOWEVER, IN SOFT RED WINTER AND SOUTHWESTERN AREAS, DRY CONDITIONS PERSISTED AND FUTURE MARKETS WERE STRONG. GULF DEMAND MIXED, BEST INTEREST FOR SOYBEANS.

IN THE UNITED STATES, WINTER WHEAT WAS 74 PERCENT HEADED. HARVEST GAINED MOMENTUM IN THE SOUTHEAST WINTER WHEAT CONDITION VAIED ACROSS THE NATION CROP CONDITION WAS MOSTLY GOOD TO FAIR IN THE CORN BELT AND SOUTHEAST DESPITE SIGNIFICANT PRECIPITATION, THE CROP REMAINED MOSTLY FAIR IN THE NORTHERN AND CENTRAL GREAT PLAINS IN KANSAS, WIDESPREAD RAIN WAS GOOD FOR WHEAT BUT WAS TOO LIGHT AND TOO LATE FOR SOME DRYLAND FIELDS IN WESTERN AREAS A FEW FIELDS NEARED MATURITY IN SOUTHER KANSAS. CORN WAS

MOSTLY GOOD TO FAIR IN MOST AREAS OF THE NATION. DRYNESS CAUSED CONDITION TO REGISTER FAIR TO GOOD IN SOME CORN BELT STATES. CORN PLANTING NEARED COMPLETION IN KANSAS. MINOR REPLANTING WAS NECESSARY FOLLOWING RAINS. EMERGENCE WAS GOOD AND MOISTURE WAS SUFFICIENT FOR EARLY GROWTH. SOYBEANS WERE 74 PERCENT SEEDED AND APPROACHED COMPLETION IN THE CORN BELT.

IN THE U.S.S.R., TIMELY RAINS OVER THE WESTERN AND SOUTHERN UKRAIN AND THE NORTH CAUCASUS BENEFIT WINTER GRAINS ENTERING THE REPRODUCTIVE PHASE OF DEVELOPMENT. IN THE NEW LANDS, SPRING GRAIN PLANTING PROGRESSES WITH MINIMAL DELAYS, BUT UNUSUALLY COOL WEATHER SLOWS CROP EMERGENCE AND EARLY GROWTH. IN SOUTH AMERICA, WETNESS PERSISTS IN SOUTH-CENTRAL BRAZIL DRY, COOL WEATHER CONTINUES OVER ARGENTINA'S CROP AREAS, EXTENDING INTO EXTREME SOUTHERN BRAZIL.

THE PHILIPPINES WILL TENDER UNDER EXPORT BONUS ON 125,000 TONNES OF NORTHERN/DARK NORTHERN SPRING WHEAT AND 50,000 OF WESTERN WHITE WHEAT. SOUTH KOREA'S NATIONAL LIVESTOCK COOPERATIVES FEDERATION WILL TENDER THURSDAY FOR 150,000 TONNES OF U.S. NO. 3 YELLOW CORN, 15.0 PCT MOISTURE, FOR AUG-OCT SHIPMENT. TUNISIA WILL TENDER THURSDAY FOR 55,000 TONNES OF U.S. NO. 2 YELLOW CORN UNDER PL480 FOR JUNE-AUG SHIPMENT. EGYPT BOUGHT 200,000 TONNES OF OPTIONAL-ORIGIN CORN FOR JUN/JULY SHIPMENT.

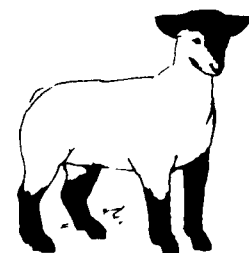
