COMMENT: TRADING ACTIVITY WAS LIGHT TO MODERATE AND GENERALLY UNAGGRESSIVE ON MOST ITEMS. CUTLETS WERE ADEQUATE AND IN GOOD OVERALL BALANCE FOR THE LIGHT TO FAIR DEMAND. SUPPLIES OF WHOLE BREASTS WERE LIGHT BUT SUFFICIENT TO SATISFY MOST BUYERS' NEEDS AND MANY WERE LIMITING RECEIPTS TO STANDING COMMITMENTS. LEGS WERE ADEQUATE TO FULLY ADEQUATE AND IN BETTER BALANCE THAN LEG QUARTERS, WHICH WERE READILY AVAILABLE AND TRADING AT LOWER LEVELS. WINGS MET A GOOD STEADY CALL FROM BUYERS AND CLEARANCES WERE WELL-MAINTAINED AT MOSTLY UNCHANGED PRICES.

Demand for ready-to-cook whole birds was generally good, but expected to taper off considerably as the week progresses and pipelines are filled. Supplies were currently clearing well. Demand for parts was moderate to good as dealers replenished stocks following the holiday. Less than trucklot asking prices were 1 cent higher at 69-77 cents. Live supplies were mostly moderate with weights usually desirable. Slaughter schedules were moderately heavy. The undertone was at best steady.
