Less than trucklot asking prices were 3 cents lower at 68 to 76 cents. live supplies were moderate. Weights were generally desirable. Slaughter schedules were moderately heavy. The undertone was weak.

Whole breast had increased in availability and buyers bid sharply lower for new receipts; however, few negotiated sales were reported as most looked to commercial quotes for direction. Legs and particularly leg quarters were fully adequate to ample. Wings were in best balance with some spot trading noted at 59 cents.
