Herby D. Lutz, Chester, S.C., is the first place winner of this year's contest. He will be the recipient of a \$500 cash award and a commemorative plaque. The son of Herbert and Betty Lutz, he finished second in last year's contest.

Five years ago, he started his Jersey herd with the purchase of three Jersey heifers. Since this time, his herd has grown in both numbers and production. He now owns 33 milking cows and 27

nation for both milk and fat among DHIR herds of 30 to 49 cows. The 1987 DHIR herd averages were 15,791 lbs. milk and 741 lbs. fat. With an average Cow Index of +\$46, the herd ranks ninth nationally.

For the past four years, Lutz has been a buyer at the National Pot O'Gold Sale. His 1986 purchase, Greenwood Chief Glad Tidings, ranks 107 on the current USDA High Cow Performance Index at List +266.

To develop his top ranking herd, Lutz, age 18, has had to put his ter at Raleigh to help keep herd records. He mates all of his cattle using artificial insemination for which he attended training sessions. With the help of Dr. Boyd Parr, winner of this same contest in 1971. Herby D, has learned how to balance feed rations on the computer.

His Jersey activities have included serving as president of the South Carolina Junior Jersey Cattle Club for the past two years and on the 1988 All American Junior Show Committee. He also enjoys exhibiting his Jerseys at the dairy science. After college, he plans to return to the herd. "I have several goals I want to obtain. I want to breed a contract cow and breed a cow that wins her class at the All American," comments Lutz.
