

Demand for ready-to-cook whole birds was fair to fairly good overall. Supplies were generally fully adequate. In the parts complex leg quarters were in a tighter posiuon while skinned boneless breast were in excess of trade needs. The remaining items were at least adequate. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 54 to 68 cents. Discounting continued in an effort to stimulate movement, especially on the heavier sizes. Live supplies were moderate. Weights were desirable to mostly heavy. Slaughter schedules moderately heavy. The undertone was barely steady to steady.
