

Prices were lower on mediums in the Midwest, balance unchanged. The market tone was generally steady. Retail demand showed improvement in all regions due partially to specials and first of the month business and was mostly moderate in a full range from light to good. Supplies were adequate to fully adequate and generally better balanced. Breakers provided a moderate demand for shell eggs. Live supplies of spent hens were generally adequate under a steady market tone.
