HONESDALE (Wayne) - The 1989 Wayne County Dairy Day will be held Thursday, March 9, 1989, from 9:30 a.m. - 3:15 p.m. in the Wayne County Veterans' Memorial Armory located on Tryon Street, Honesdale, according to co-chairmen Garry Rutledge and David Hudy. Dairy Day is held each year to provide dairy farmers with new technology, and to recognize the importance of the dairy industry to our local economy.
