testing benefit his land. He practices timely mowing to help protect wildlife living on his land. Reidenhour said, he worked with the conservation service for three to four years to achieve his present conservation plan.

Farmers receiving honorable mention in addition to Lobb were Larry and Lloyd Kehl of Windsor Township for their grass waterways and manure storage on their 600 acres; and Ralph Stoltzfus who farms 174 acres in Caernarvon Township. Stoltzfus utilized waterways, terrace, drainfield and manure storage to enhance his property.

The district and the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service held their annual banquet at the Kutztown Grange. The organizations recognized many for their outstanding contributions for soil and water contribution.

Donald Reinert, who teaches vocational agriculture at Kutztown Area High School was named the outstanding conservation educator. For 24 years, Reinert has guided FFA students and Young Farmer classes into conservation farming methods.

The Brown Swiss record went to the herd belonging to Tom and Joy Crothers. Their 77 Swiss had a record of 15,615m 649f 556p. The Jersey record was held by Middleground Farm owned by Ned Davis. His Jerseys produced 14,190m 675f 519p.

Peter and Richard Morris held the record for the greatest increase in milk, fat and protein production over last year. Their herd of 44 cows had increases of 1,522m 71f and 58 pounds of protein. The high cow for lifetime production for Holsteins was held by Pioneer Valley. Their 13-year-old cow had a record of 216,250m 5,823f. For the Guernseys it went to England Farms with their 14-year-old holding a record of 143,270m 6,492f.

The high cows for fat corrected milk for the Holsteins went to William Fell 31,975m; Guernsey,

Mt. Ararat Farm 21,943m, Brown Swiss, Elmbrook Farm 22,356m, and for the Jersey breed it went to Pleasant View Farm 19,251m. Charles Moore and Pioneer Farms had the most cows with records over 150,000. They each had four cows followed by Charles Holt and Son With three.
