> This grant program is designed to encourage 4-H groups to develop models for marketing, porkpromotion, and consumerawareness programs to be tested and duplicated in other states. The grants, ranging from \$500 to \$2,350, also were given to groups in Arkansas, Illinois, Iowa, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Mississippi, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, and Texas. Funds will be used for activities such as increasing protein in the diet of low-income families, developing a pork classroom curriculum, swine clinics and tours, and pork exhibits and in-store promotions.
