Trucklot buying interest was fair to good on most items. Cutlets were in light supply and sellers easily cleared stocks at higher trending levels. Whole breasts, both line run and rib-on were in close balance, particularly white product, and some boners reported shifting or increasing receipts of whole birds, wogs and front halves. Legs remained in irregular distribution while leg quarters moved handily at higher prices. Wings were in heaviest supply and slow in clearing at lower trending levels.
