SUNBURY (Northumberland Co.) — The board of directors of the Northumberland County Conservation District has approved Chesapeake Bay funding agreements with three local farmers, according to Robert Pardoe, Jr., district chairman. Approved for funding are John Esenwein, Rush Township; Donald Hauck, Upper Mahanoy Township; and Jacob Boyle, Lower Augusta Township.

Farmers that participate in the Chesapeake Bay Program are entitled to receive up to \$30,000 in state funds to install conservation practices to prevent agricultural pollution. Since the program began in 1987, the Northumberland County Conservation District has received \$295,000 in Chesapeake Bay grants from the state to cost share the establishment of conservation practices on local

The Northumberland County Conservation District has been accepted into the Pocono-Northeast Resource Conservation and Development Area, according to Richard Morgan, conservation district director. Other counties already in the area include Carbon, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Monroe, Schuylkill, Pike, and Wayne.
