SOYBEAN EXPORT ORDERS AGAIN SLOW AND OF SMALL VOLUME WITH YEAR TO DATE TONNAGE WELL BELOW PREVIOUS YEAR. GOOD MOISTURE FOR 89 SOYBEAN CROP WITH SOME PLACES NEEDING A FEW MORE DRY DAYS TO COM-PLETE PLANTING. ON CHICAGO BOARD, THERE IS AN 85 CENT SPREAD BETWEEN JULY AND A LOWER QUOTE FOR NOVEMBER BEANS.
