Acres Wheat Update: Wheat futures continued to strengthen today and added from 6 to 6-1/2 cents to yesterday's gains. Professional buying and some commissionhouse short covering was featured with further support tied to spillover from rallying soybeans and corn. Underlying support was provided by continued harvest delays due to rain in the Delta and South east and cash market strength. Whispering of upcoming export interest by China and the USSR also helped with the USDA announcing after the close a sale of 100,000 metric tonnes to China. July closed out the day at \$3.98-3/4 while the December settled at \$4.05-3/4 after trading in a range from \$4.00-1/2 to \$4.06.

Acres Cattle Update: Live cattle futures closed higher this afternoon from 10 to 45 points while feeders lost 20 to 37 points. Activity throughout the session was light with buying tied to firm cash market fundamentals. Many participants took to the sidelines today in readiness for Friday's 7-State USDA Cattle on Feed Report. Pressure in the feeder cattle was tied to sharp gains in com prices despite a sharply higher CME index. Support was provided by continued activity at the auction barns with prices improving steadily. Pre-estimates for the Cattle on Feed report pegged on feed numbers June 1 at 99.6%. May placements at 85.1% and Marketings at 102.1%.
