

# Pennsylvania Cattlemen's Field Day Set

UNIVERSITY PARK, (Centre Co.) — The 15th annual Cattlemen's Summer Field Day will be here July 15 at South Mountain Farms in McKnightstown, Pa. Penn State, the Adams County Beef Producers Association and the Pennsylvania Charolais Association are co-sponsoring the event, which starts at 9:00 a.m. and runs through the afternoon.

The event features demonstrations by 25 exhibitors of permanent electric fence designs, irrigation systems and other items. There will be a judging contest and a discussion of show-calf types. Morning and afternoon tours will include the Gettysburg Battlefield, Eisenhower Farm's cattle operations and Mason-Dixon Farms, a 1300-cow operation noted for innovative building designs and progressive technology.

A first at this year's field day will be the introduction of Keystone Rib-Eye on a Roll, prepared by the Pennsylvania Cattlemen's Association Directors in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Beef Council. There will be a small charge for the lunch.

Speakers at this year's event include Ray Grimes, Dennis Byrne, Nancy Scott Bushy and Bob Tibbs, beef producers from various regions of Pennsylvania and Maryland. They will emphasize the flexibility of beef operations combined with other farm operations or a full-time job off the farm.

Glenn D. Eberly, president of the Pennsylvania Cattlemen's Association, will present an update on state and national con-

cerns of cattle raisers. Dr. John Comerford, assistant professor of animal science at Penn State, will report on a comparative study of beef and holstein steers fed different forage proportions and protein sources. Dr. Lowell L. Wilson, Penn State professor of animal science, and Ray Grimes will co-chair the event. "We would like to invite everyone interested in cattle—producers, marketing personnel and those who just like to eat and talk beef," says Wilson.

The Berks County Cattlemen's Association will be sponsoring a bus trip to the event. All interested beef and dairy cattle producers are invited to join the tour, regardless of membership in the Berks County Cattlemen's Association, said Miller. The price for the trip, which includes bus fare and all field day activities, is \$10 per per-

son. A Keystone ribeye steak sandwich lunch will be available at the field day for the price of \$2. Reservations will be taken on a first come-first served basis. The deadline for reservations is July 10. Contact Sheila Miller at 215/589-5617 or Clyde Myers at 215/378-1327 for details.

The 47-passenger bus will leave the Berks County Agriculture Center at 7 a.m. and arrive at the field day for registration at 9 a.m.
