Demand for ready to cook whole fryers was fair. Supplies were fully adequate on 2 1/4-2 1/2 pound sizes, adequate on the heavier sizes. In the parts complex, supplies of cutlets and whole breasts were more than adequate for a sluggish demand, legs were adequate, leg quarters were in close balance, and wings were ample and being pushed to clear. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 59-70 cents. Live supplies were adequate with average weights in a desirable range. The slaughter schedules for today were moderately heavy.
