Movement of ready to cook whole fryers was generally fair but buyer interest for additional product was very light. Supplies were fully adequate for trade needs. In the parts complex, supplies of cutlets were ample and being pushed to clear, other parts were still more than adequate but some improvement in buyer interest was noted. Less than trucklot asking prices were generally unchanged at 56-64 cents. Live supplies were adequate. Average live weights were in a desirable range. Today's slaughter schedules ranged moderately heavy to heavy. The trade sentiment was barely steady to weak.
