Less than trucklot asking prices were steady at 56-65 cents. Live supplies were adequate. Average weights were trending heavier but still in a desirable range. Today's slaughter schedules were moderately heavy. The trade sentiment was generally steady.

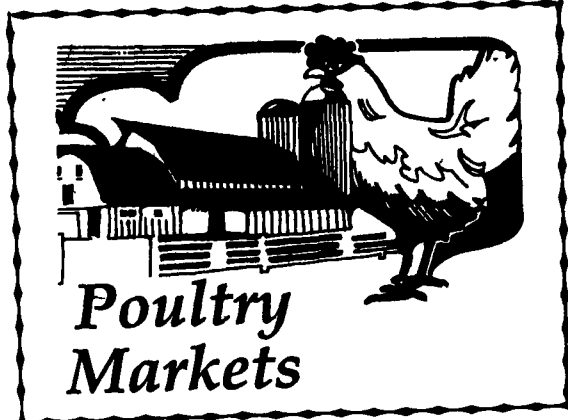
