UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.) — John Nordin of Russell was the consigner of the hightesting and high-selling ram lamb at the 11th Annual Pennsylvania Performance Tested Ram Sale. This February twin ram finished the test with an index ratio of 121, an average daily gain of 1.14 pounds, and a final weight of 202 pounds. The index ratio figure is a composite that takes into consideration the average daily gain, weight per day of age, and adjusted fat value. The ram brought \$750, and was purchased by Welty Keenan of Hunker.

Selling second high within the Hampshires at \$400 was an October, 1988, consignment of Joanne O'Connor of Monongahela. Finishing with an index ratio of 100, the ram had a final weight of 266 and a loin eye measurement of 4.00 square inches.

The high-indexing Suffolk was an offering from Lyn Lee Farms of State College. Their February

ram had a final weight of 203 pounds and the highest average daily gain of the tested rams; 1.27 pounds. The ram sold for \$375 to Ken Wilson of Newville, Ohio.

Bringing \$400 was a Lauden Acres ram that finished with an index ratio of 100. This October, 1988, twin had an average daily gain of 1.06 pounds, and a final weight of 255. The ram was purchased by Neal Baker of Knoxville. The ram's twin also finished with an index ratio of 100. He had an average daily gain of 1.05 pounds, and a final weight of 256. The ram sold for \$375.

In the Polled Dorsets, consignments of Nittany Valley Livestock of Bellefonte, and Jennifer Hoke of Hanover tied for the high test in the senior division. The Nittany Valley ram, born in September of 1988, had an average daily gain of .76 pounds, and a final weight of 224. The Hoke ram had an average daily gain of .74 pounds, and a final weight of 219. Both rams had 106 as an index ratio, with the Nittany Valley ram selling for \$325


ratio of 111, the Nittany Valley ram having an average daily gain of .95; the Nix Besser, .88. The Nittany Valley ram went for \$350 to Audrey Garmine of Huntingdon. The Nix Besser ram brought \$475, and was purchased by Howard Lewis of Felton. Topping the Polypay breed was a George Garner ram that finished with an index ratio of 100 and sold for \$250. The high-indexing Polypay was a consignment of Marlin Sadler of Myerstown; this February ram brought \$175. Another

> brought a final bid of \$200. A total of 47 rams were offered at the sale with the average price being \$232. According to Glen Eberly, manager of the Meat Animal Evaluation Center, prices were down slightly from last year but were stronger than in prior years. The averages for specific breeds were: Hampshires - \$248; Dorsets - \$260; Suffolks - \$264; and Polypays - \$195. One Columbia brought \$100; one Montadale, \$100; and one Shropshire - \$225.
