### National Egg Market August 23, 1989

The market tone was fully steady to firm in instances. Shell egg movement varied as to class of product. Heavier weight nest runs were usually in the best position while cartoned product war attracting the least interest. Supplies were also in an irregularly balanced position but generally confidently held. Breakers bid lower for breaking stock and in several areas adjusted schedules to avoid working with higher priced raw materials.

## Eastern PA & NJ Poultry August 23, 1989

Light type hens traded in a wider price range but were mostly 1 cent higher than last report. The trade sentiment was unsettled. Offers from producers were short of buyer needs. Several flocks were booked to move off farms next week at prices to be determined, and some bids were still not covered. Processors operated full schedules but most report some line time available through early September. Supplies of canner product were adequate for the fairly good demand.
