Jim and Gus Parlett of Airville exhibited both champion gilts. The January littermates are RRA7 Mr T 7 daughters out of TM7 Jenny 3-4. TM9 Jenny 2-9 beat out her sister for the championship title.

YORKSHIRE

The champion gilt and reserve champion boar went to littermates shown by Annville exhibitor Blue Mountain View Farms. Owned by Charlie Bomgardner, the pair are February progeny of HDH7 EZ 3-8 out of SFR8 Miss Spade. The

winning gilt is BMV9 Miss Spade 15-1, while her brother is BMV9 EZ 15-4.

The champion York boar was exhibited by Strawbridge & McClary, who also were named premier York exhibitor. The boar is JES9 Stetson 5-6, a WGW7 Stetson 7-1 son out of JES7 Miss TOTO 2-5.

The reserve champion gilt was exhibited by Wilson's Yorkshires. The New Freedom York breeders also had last year's champion boar. Their gilt, WW49 Wilson Lady

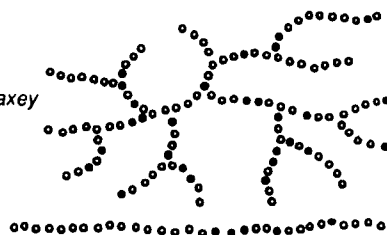
