Supplies were fully adequate with some product being offered at prices below normal premiums. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged to lower at 46-53 cents. Live supplies were adequate. Average live weights ranged desirable to heavy. Today's processing schedules were very light with some plants not operating. The trade was unsettled. In the parts complex, supplies of cutlets and whole breasts were in balance with demand, dark meat items were irregular and ranged adequate to fully adequate, and wings were tight.
