Movement of ready-to-cook whole fryers was light but about as expected. Supplies were adequate. Less than trucklot asking prices were steady at 44-52 cents. Live supplies were adequate with average weights in a full range but mostly desirable. Processor schedules were very light with some plants not operating and others on reduced volumes today. The trade sentiment was steady. In the parts complex, supplies of breasts items were adequate and clearing, legs and leg quarters were fully adequate for the sluggish buyer interest, and wings continued short of trade needs.
