

## Sheep Shearers Can Learn At School

KEENE, N.H. — Plans are under way for an advanced Sheep Shearing School, sponsored by the University of New Hampshire cooperative extension and Cornell University, to be held March 10, 11, and 12, 1990 at the Cornell Sheep Research Barn in Dryden, New York.

Shearers will have an opportunity to learn from one of New Zealand's senior shearing instructors,

Robin Middleton. Robin will be providing instruction not only on shearing technique, but also on equipment maintenance, comb "experting," wool handling, diet, and exercise.

The course will start at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday. All of the formal instruction will be conducted on Saturday and Sunday. Monday will be a full day for practice, and Middleton will be available for one-on-one help.

We've organized the course this way so that those that can only stay for Saturday and Sunday won't miss any of the instruction," said Bruce Clement, Cheshire County extension agent.

The course fee is \$50.00 per person. Meals and lodging are not included. The course will be limited to 20 people on a first-come, first-served basis. Registration deadline is February 23, 1990.
