Live supplies were adequate. Average live weights were irregular but mostly on the heavy side of desirable Today's processing schedules were also heavy. The trade sentiment was unscitled In the parts complex, supplies of breast items were about adequate for current needs, legs and leg quarters were at least adequate, and wings ranged fully adequate to ample

The market tone was unsettled and cautious. Demand was mixed with current demand overall on the light side. However, several areas reported a growing interest for retail promotional activity. Although supplies were in good balance with most inventories on the increase most distributors were confident that supplies would clear for the holidays Breakers were generally unaggressive concentrating on clearing existing floor stocks.

Prices were trending lower under an unsettled and cautious trade sentiment. Inquiry was about moderate but most buyers only bought what was absolutely necessary. Raw material supplies continued to increase and further processors easily maintained desired schedules.
