sizes were short of immediate needs, but heavier sizes were fully adequate and being offered at competitive prices. Less than trucklot asking prices were steady at 55-64 cents. Live supplies were adequate. Average live weights ranged desirable to heavy. Today's processing schedules were moderately heavy. The trade sentiment was unsettled but barely steady at best. In the parts complex, supplies of cutlets and wings were in close balance to instances short of needs, legs were adequate, and whole breasts and leg quarters were fully adequate to ample and slow to clear even with lower asking prices.
