Movement of ready to cook whole fryers was fairly good. Supplies were somewhat irregular and ranged close to fully adequate. Less than trucklot asking prices were steady at 61-69 cents. Live supplies were adequate with average weights in a full range. Processing schedules were heavy. The trade sentiment was unsettled but no better than steady. In the parts complex, supplies of wings were tight, leg quarters were barely adequate, legs were about adequate, cutlets were at least adequate, and whole breasts were irregularly distributed and ranged fully adequate to burdensome and being forced to clear in some areas.
