Movement of ready to cook whole fryers was fairly good today but about as expected. However, buyer inquiries for additional product for next week deliveries were better than expected. Supplies were in good balance with immediate needs. Less than trucklot asking prices were steady at 52-62 cents. Live supplies were adequate. Average live weights continue to run desirable to heavy. Processor schedules were heavy. The trade sentiment was steady. In the parts complex, supplies of cutlets and legs were adequate, whole breasts were short of the active buyer demand, wings were in close balance to tight, and leg quarters were at least adequate but improved buyer interest for next week deliveries was noted.

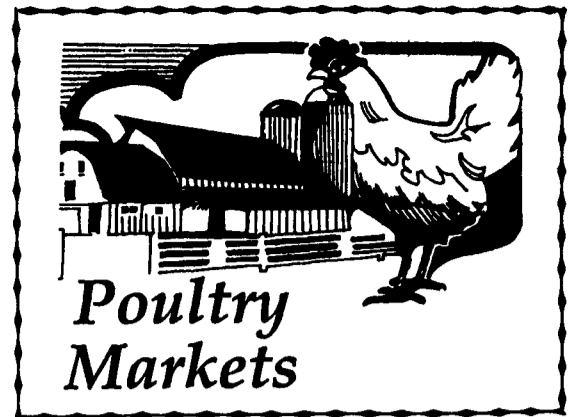
