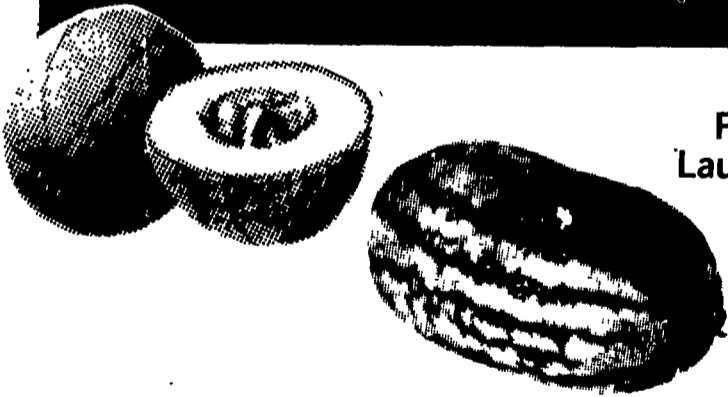

**"Wetlands need preserving.
But DER is off base"**

says Charlie Benner



Snyder county farmer Charlie
Benner is a regional coordinator
for Pennsylvania Ag Republicans.

Did you hear about the Northern
Tier farmer who was cited for
cleaning out an old drainage ditch?
He first learned about it in his local
newspaper.

No phone call. No subpoena.
Even the operator of a South Philly
crack house has more rights.

Fact is, you're in trouble if you
drain a wetland, plant it, pasture it
or build on it without a permit from
the PA Department of Environmen-
tal Resources.

And that wetland can be as little
as a square foot, according to DER
regs.

Barbara Hafer, Republican nomi-
nee for governor, has taken a
strong exception to DER's handling
of wetlands.

Also standing up to DER is State
Senator Roger Madigan, an Ag
Republican from Bradford county
who introduced Senate bill 1326. It
would:

- * Compensate farmers for wet-
lands taken out of production
- * Exempt land with history of
farm use during past 25 years.
- * Give farmers the same one
acre and ten acre exemptions
granted by federal agencies.

Most farmers agree wetlands
should be preserved. But we
deplore DER's heavy handed treat-
ment. So does Barbara Hafer.

"We can prevent any net loss of
wetlands," she insists, "without run-
ning roughshod over landowners."
