considered a bureaucratic nightmare by many farmers and other property owners in our Commonwealth.

Others say that DER has too many programs to administer them all properly. DER is already heavily overburdened with its enormous responsibility to develop, promulgate and enforce laws and regulations for coal and noncoal mining, the storage tank program, air and water quality standards, municipal waste facilities, residual waste facilities, hazardous waste facilities and the state's recycling program among others.

Because of this large workload,

and the direct impact that wetland ists, to discuss the preparation of regulations have on the agriculture community, I am supporting a proposed amendment that would transfer responsibility for the wetland program from DER to the Agriculture Department.

If the switch were to take place. the Agriculture Department could handle the program in a manner that would be less hurried and more sensitive to the concerns of those who are most affected by such regulations, primarily farmers.

DER Secretary Arthur Davis met with a group of building industry and agriculture representatives, as well as environmentalnew, stricter regulations. In light of this action, the proposed amendment has been put on hold until we receive further word from Secretary Davis on the regulations.

If DER continues to ignore the concerns of our farmers, I will urge immediate adoption of the amendment, which contains a concrete definition of a wetland. When we attempt to protect our environment we must insure that we are not using such a broadbrushed approach that we arbitrarily restrict the use of vital farmlands not worthy of being cited as wetlands.

The Glatfelter Insurance Challenge of the Breeds will be held again on Saturday evening in the large arena. At the 1989 show, a paint horse won the challenge.




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
